Dear parents, carers and students.

Amazingly we are already at the penultimate newsletter of the half term. No wonder I feel like we have been so busy. It is really hard to keep up with everything at the moment. With the literary festival in full swing over the last couple of weeks, which has seen trips out, authors coming in and a range of competitions and activities throughout the week, not to mention the Duke of Edinburgh trip which returned safely last weekend.

Next week promises to be just as busy with student leadership events including sports competitions and charity events. Next week will also culminate in our annual remembrance service for Frank Armes. As a student of our forerunner school, he lost his life in the service and protection of his country during the Falklands War and we have committed to ensure his sacrifice is remembered. This week I was asked to comment on the news that McDonalds had overturned the planning block on putting a new drive-thru around the corner from the academy. I thought carefully and sent a press release to explain our position. The press edit these things down, but I thought you might want to see the whole press release for context...

Jon Ford Principal of Open Academy, part of Diocese of Norwich Education and Academies Trust said: "We are very keen to ensure that our students grow up to live healthy and fulfilled lives. Thanks to Jess and the team in our canteen, students at Open Academy have access to daily healthy, varied and tasty food. As part of the Big Breakfast initiative at the Academy over 150 students enjoy a free to all breakfast to start their day at the Academy and we are particularly proud of our food tech programme under the direction of Miss Luter which aims to give all our students the ability to prepare the full range of savoury and sweet healthy dishes that they may want in their adult lives.

The recipe book that the students develop from Year 7 until they finish their food tech studies ensures that they will always be able to enjoy healthy food from high quality basic ingredients available locally. The students are also taught what healthy eating is all about and would understand very clearly the effects of fast food on their health if not eaten in moderation.

From a school perspective, we would not be encouraging the siting of a new fast food restaurants in our local vicinity, however we recognise that the local economy is more than just the Academy and so we would be very keen to ensure that if the McDonald's does go ahead, that they would enter into the same agreement that we have with other local fast food providers such as Kentucky and Costa Coffee which both exist opposite the school gates. The agreement is that they don't serve students in school uniform between the hours of 8:00 AM and 6:00 PM unless they are accompanied by their parents or carers. We have found this works very well with our local fast-food outlets and thanks to these local agreements we find that our students are learning to live around the availability of fast food without over using it. We would therefore love to meet with the new McDonalds franchisee and engage in a positive conversation about the existing agreement we have with other local fast food outlets.

It would be good to think that, if it goes go ahead, McDonalds will honour the same agreements locally. Furthermore, it would be great to think that McDonald's will continue to develop it's healthier options for the younger more health-conscious consumers and I'm confident that our students would understand the benefits of these options well when they do occasionally eat out."


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3. Library




Book Club
