It is always joyous to see their lively energetic enthusiasm and this year has been no different. They have had a full range of curriculum tasters from tech lessons and PE to drama, music and all the core subjects. Assemblies every day have covered some introductions to all they need to know and seeing their smiling, albeit tired faces, at the end of the day it looks like they have really enjoyed their opportunity to get settled before the summer break. I hope they have a fantastic final week saying goodbye back in their primary schools next week and then look forward to joining us all next year.
